

Metric Cooking Utensils Make The Change Easier

Editor's Note: Fourth in a series on the metric system. Adjusting home food preparation to the metric system will probably cause little trouble, says Louise Young, consumer economics specialist at the University of Wisconsin. "Actually, after you become acquainted with the system, it probably will be easier to use. Measurements are based on tens rather than the complicated pound-ounces and cup-tablespoon-teaspoon measurements," she comments.

Today, the standard measuring cup is equivalent to 236.6 milliliters. If the change to the metric system is made, an agreement would need to be made on the standard cup as a fraction of the liter — perhaps 250 milliliters. This would be 1/4 liter.

Then, if the teaspoon relationship to the cup remains the familiar 16 to 1 ratio, favorite recipes can still be used.

The product would be a little large but the ingredient proportions would remain the same.

This small increase in volume would not require any immediate purchase of a new cake pan. The old one could still be used.

Changing to the metric system could have advantages for home food preparation. It could lead to simpler calculations for formulas, diets and recipes.

With interest in international foods, exchange of recipes and food preparation information would be simplified. If international standards for sizes are developed, cooking utensils and measuring devices could more easily be exchanged between countries.

The replacement cost of new measuring devices would be small since the main items would be the series of metric measuring "cups" in liter and fraction of the liter sizes and measuring spoons.

Conversion to Centigrade temperature from Fahrenheit could be simplified for the cook by providing a simple table showing the temperature equivalents.
