

Seventh District Has Large Business Gain

Chicago. — The Seventh federal reserve district, which includes Wisconsin, has seen during the past year the most rapid expansion in employment and pay rolls in the manufacturing industries of any year since the N.R.A. C. S. Young, president of the Federal Reserve Bank of Chicago, announced Thursday.

His report revealed that by the end of May employment showed a gain of nearly 27 per cent over the corresponding period of a year ago. This gain was all the more striking in that it was recorded over a fairly high level, whereas the increase during the first year after passage of the National Recovery Act, which resulted in a rise of 35 per cent in employment and 50 per cent in pay rolls, was from the low level prevailing in June, 1933.

Disputes Are Settled

In the monthly comparison, May indicated a rise in employment and larger pay rolls in practically all industries in all sections throughout the Seventh district. The rise in wage payments during May was particularly large, as the result of the settlement of disputes which during the previous month had interrupted the normal operating schedule.

Responding to this augmented purchasing power of increased employment and pay rolls, department store trade in the Seventh district has continued to show increases in recent months over the corresponding periods of 1940. A study of sales in Chicago, Milwaukee, Detroit and Indianapolis showed that the difference

in January ranged from 5 per cent to 18 per cent, with an average of 9 per cent for the district. By the end of May, this difference in level had increased, ranging from 15 per cent to 25 per cent and averaging 18 per cent for the district. These increases have been most consistent in Milwaukee; beginning with January which registered a gain of 13 per cent, sales increased 14 per cent in February, 17 per cent in March, 20 per cent in April, and 25 per cent in May.

Dollar Volume Up

The rise in dollar volume of sales has, to some extent, reflected price advances, but there has also been a sustained increase in the physical volume of goods distributed. All of the principal cities of the district have shown an expansion in retail trade since the defense program was started. With an increase of 22 per cent, May sales recorded the largest gain in the year to year comparison for far in 1941. May sales at Lansing increased 33 per cent over those of a year ago. Detroit sales registered a gain of 28 per cent in this comparison; Milwaukee and Fort Wayne recorded gains of 27 per cent.

A large part of this increase in employment and pay rolls and trade has stemmed from the increased activity in the steel industry.

Agriculture has been sharing in this expansion through higher prices for livestock, grain, and dairy products. Markets have been unusually large. During May, receipts gained 75 per cent.

Boards Lack Time To Put Budget Law Into Effect

Madison, Wis. — (AP) — There is insufficient time to comply with the Thomson local budget law this year, the state department of public instruction informed local school board members yesterday.

Referring to provisions of the law which require local budgets to be published or posted at least 10 days before public hearings on them, and that the hearings must be held not less than 14 days after the budget is made public, the department said:

"As this law became in force on June 19, there is insufficient time for school boards to comply with it before the annual school district meetings."

The department, which said it had received numerous inquiries regarding operation of the law this year, declared that under statutes enacted in previous years union free high schools were required to hold annual meetings on the last Monday in June, and common school districts on the second Monday in July.

Most city school district budgets are unaffected by these provisions because their expenditures are in-

cluded in community budgets, usually adopted late in the year.

The Thomson law requires all taxing units, except Milwaukee and Milwaukee county, to hold public hearings on their budgets; list anticipated revenues and expenditures and show comparable figures for the two preceding years. It provides that the budget cannot be changed except with the approval of two-thirds of the governing body.
