Barbara Haslow, New Alice In Dairyland, Begins Reign

MILWAUKEE (AP)—A charming brunette with a pony tail, Barbara Haslow, the daughter of a Clark County hardware dealer, today began her 12-month reign as Wisconsin's Alice in Dairyland.

The 19-year-old Miss Haslow was crowned before 10,000 persons attending the highlight program in the grandstands. She will preside as official hostess during the remainder of the fair, ending next Sunday.

For the next year she will appear at various functions in the state and travel to other parts of the country as a representative of Wisconsin agriculture.

One of three children of Mr. and Mrs. Edwin C. Haslow, the new Alice was crowned by Nancy Kay Trewyn of White-water, the retiring fair queen. Miss Haslow, a 1956 graduate of Marshfield High School last year attended the University of Wisconsin where she was a candidate for prom queen.

Among those present as she received her crown were her father and mother. Mrs. Haslow described her daughter as a good student and added that she had a boy friend, but "I won't say they're going steady."

Asked about her daughter's pony tail, Mrs. Haslow said "it took about a year to grow it." Miss Haslow won over three other princesses, Constance Lutz, 19, of Oconto Falls; Janet Trapp, 19, of Green Bay, and Carole Calabrese, 18, of Milwaukee.

Miss Lutz, also a University of Wisconsin student, was crowned Wisconsin Dairy Princess and will represent the state in a competition Nov. 11-15 at Baton Rouge, La. sponsored by the American Dairy Assn.

The tanned Miss Lutz, with brown eyes and brown hair, is majoring in economics and education. She said that "last summer I worked the night shift in a bean factory."

Another feature of the Dairy Day program was a parade of livestock champions and the honoring of butter and cheese-makers. Attendance Wednesday was 68,750 despite rain that fell during the afternoon and evening. The gate on the same day a year ago was counted at \$6,639.

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Try To Prevent More Violence In Connersville, Ind., Strike

CONNERSVILLE, Ind. (UPI)—State police today sought to prevent renewed acts of labor violence in this strike-shattered central Indiana city.

Police patrolling the National Metal Products plant, scene of a two-month-long walkout, reported all quiet as non-strikers left work Wednesday night.

Violence broke out for the second day as the shift entered the plant Wednesday morning.

Striking members of the International Union of Electrical, Radio and Machine Workers overturned a foreman's car and threw bricks and stones at other cars in the plant parking lot.

Gov. Harold W. Handley called on state police to help control the violence Tuesday and troopers moved in quickly and broke up the outbreak.

"It all happened pretty fast," said one policeman, "but we broke it up as fast as we could."

Police said a group of marchers broke ranks and overturned the car of Harold Swain, a plant supervisor, while other pickets laid down a barrage of stones that damaged five other vehicles including a state police car.

Two pickets were arrested for jostling workers entering the plant but later were released on bond.

The strike broke out June 24 when two union officials were fired for passing out union literature on company time.

The plant, which normally employs about 260 persons, has been in intermittent production since that time. About 100 non-strikers began returning to work this week.
